Another summer has passed by us, and we are having a warm fall here so far in Southern Alberta, after months of summer heat waves. Farmers in our community have been racking in the crop, and the smoke from forest fires in the West were not as bad as previous years. The mountains still do not have much snow and we need the moisture badly, so hoping for large dumps soon. According to the Farmer's Almanac, <u>2023-</u> <u>2024 winter</u> will be remembered as a time of "The Return Of The Brrr"—traditional winter weather is coming back as very cold temperatures are expected for much of the West.

COVID's BACK—or is it? That depends on who you ask. 2023 Tax Service Now Available



As some of you were alerted in the

A <u>new study published by the Fraser Institute</u> finds that the average Canadian family spent 45.3% of its income on taxes in 2022. That's more than housing, food, and clothing costs– combined! The total tax bill for Canadians includes visible and hidden taxes paid to all levels of government, including income tax, payroll tax, sales tax, property tax, carbon tax, health tax, and fuel and alcohol taxes. Since 1961, the average Canadian family's total tax bill has increased nominally by 2,778%, dwarfing increases in annual housing costs (1,880%), clothing (654%), and food (870%). Yes, you're going broke!

Alberta Court Rules COVID Mandates Illegal



Over the summer, an Alberta court ruled

Chief Medical Officer of Health (CMOH) Deena Hinshaw did not have the final say regarding COVID-19 health recommendations, <u>rendering them illegal</u>. According to a <u>City</u> <u>News article</u>, Justice B.E. Romaine's 90-page decision concluded "the Public Health Act requires that decisions with respect to public health orders must be made by the CMOH, or her statutorily- authorized delegate. The final decisions implemented by the impugned Orders in this case were made by the cabinet of the government of Alberta or by committees of cabinet." Further, the Military Grievances External Review Committee found the <u>vaccine mandate for</u> <u>the Canadian Armed Forces was unconstitutional</u> in a <u>ruling</u>. It's a massive win for the people which came at the right time as many governments, etc., seek to reinstate them.

Canadians Using Tax

Professionals More Than Ever

With rules getting more complex and less



time to learn the ropes, Canadian taxpayers are seeking tax pros at record rates. <u>According to Knowledge Bureau</u>, Canada's tax professional educator, almost 60% of returns filed were done by professionals like me. That's almost 18.5 million returns and climbing. One of the points Knowledge Bureau stressed was income from business, investments, and rentals. As jobs disappear, people will exit the work world and move into self-employment. This will further boost the need for a professional, and I don't see this trend reversing.

Loans, Mortgages, and Everyday Expenses Burying Canadians in Debt



and Joe just trying to stay above water. According to a <u>Globe</u> <u>and Mail article</u>, we are up to our necks in debt at a time when interest rates are at multidecade highs. <u>Knowledge</u> <u>Bureau has a detailed article</u> with all the variables, but one of the highlights is over a million households are expected to renew their mortgages in 2023. Statistics Canada states the interest portion of mortgage payments was 70% higher in the first quarter of 2023 compared to the year before. The Bank of Canada has estimated that by 2026 most taxpayers with mortgages will see increases in monthly payments of 20 to 40%; yes, that's on top of everything right now!

CRA Rules Not All Losing Businesses Are Tax Deductible



In an interesting summer tax court decision, a taxpayer lost his case when the judge

concluded his venture was not run in a commercial manner with a view to a profit. A <u>recent article</u> by tax journalist <u>Jamie</u> <u>Golombek</u> cited a Brampton, Ontario consultant was disallowed losses on the basis that the taxpayer had no source of income and, therefore, no true business. He claimed a continuous series of losses on his tax returns as far back as 1993 but eventually closed his website in 2017 without experiencing a single profitable year. Offhand, the ruling does make sense as running a loss for 24 years doesn't make sense in any form but the lesson here is even legitimate businesses showing a loss may be subject to the same scrutiny, so taxpayer beware.

Canada Student Loan Forgiveness For Family Doctors and Nurses



Doctors or residents can receive up to \$40,000 in <u>Canada</u> <u>Student Loan forgiveness</u>, \$8,000 per year, over a maximum of 5 years; while nurses or nurse practitioners can receive \$20,000 in Canada Student Loan forgiveness, \$4,000 a year, again over a maximum of 5 years. <u>A Knowledge Bureau</u> <u>article</u> details all the conditions, etc. In addition, the province of Saskatchewan offers loan forgiveness to nurses and nurse practitioners. Applicants must complete at least 400 hours total of in-person service over the 12-month period.

Taxpayers are Spending 2+ Hours on Hold With the CRA

Have you got nothing to do all day?



Great, you can now contract yourself out as a "CRA caller." Just kidding, but the delays are no joke. According to a CBC article, there's been a spike in the number of irate callers lashing out at agents after experiencing long periods on hold despite repeated promises of faster service. François Boileau, Canada's taxpayers' ombudsperson—an independent officer who investigates CRA service-related complaints-said his office will probe the agency's wait-time claims. A Knowledge Bureau article explains if the complaint matter is urgent, the Ombudsman suggests calling directly to 1-866-586-3839. Second, many communications can be done online using MyAccount. Most important, taxpayers have rights to timely communications, and CRA has published a guide to those rights. Specifically, Right #6 and #9 address the issue, but takes the taxpayer down a further time-consuming bureaucratic road: "6. You have the right to complete, accurate, clear, and timely information. . . Our enquiries agents have extensive training and reference tools that let them respond quickly and accurately to your questions and provide you with the highest quality of service. If you feel the information you received from us was inadequate...9. You have the right to lodge a service complaint and to be provided with an explanation of our findings." More to come as the story unfolds.

Backyard Burial a Tax Property Advantage? Do Your Own Research!



I have no idea if this is a conspiracy but the story itself is fascinating. Granted it's American, but the principles may apply here. Recently a <u>viral TikTok</u> by an influencer named <u>realkipforce</u> suggests homeowners bury their loved ones in the backyard, according to <u>www.dailydot.com</u>. "Did you know that if you bury a loved one in your backyard that your house now is zoned as a cemetery, and you no longer owe property taxes?" <u>she explains in the video</u>. Burying loved ones on your property <u>seems legal in most states</u> but it does not go into the tax breaks. I know Donald Trump recently <u>buried his</u> <u>ex-wife Ivana Trump at his National Golf Club in Bedminster, NJ</u>, so does he qualify for a cemetery status exempting him from taxes? It's worth looking into as he plans to build a family tomb there and to be buried there himself.

Rising Canadian Bankruptcies Bad News For Seniors



Inflation, record interest rates, and general

increases in cost of living are sending more Canadians to the poor house. A Knowledge Bureau article reports that insolvencies in Canada increased by 13.8% in May 2023 compared to the previous month. More specifically, bankruptcies increased by 19.0% and proposals by 12.2%. The total number of insolvencies in May 2023 was 30.9% higher than in May 2022, with consumer insolvencies seeing a significant jump of 59.1%. Seniors and others on a fixed income are most vulnerable as they may have to drain their savings to help their kids and grandkids stay afloat. For businesses, the easing of governmental restrictions imposed during lockdowns has led to a resurgence in business expenditures. In addition, the repayment of interest-free loans, extended under the Canada Emergency Business Account (CEBA), presents a substantial challenge to numerous small businesses. Certain sectors have faced industry-specific hurdles, notably hospitality, transportation, and construction industries.

New Disclosure Rules For Aggressive Tax Planning



A recent Knowledge Bureau article details

all the changes regarding aggressive tax planning. While some of it may be legal, many of the tactics are questionable for sure. The 30 year old book <u>"Take the Money and Run"</u> by <u>Alex Doulis</u> seems to have passed the test of time, and he is a well-received author, so I'd start by seeking someone reputable like him. I still have clients hopelessly dealing with the <u>mid 2000's donation scam</u>, and to date, over \$7 billion in tax claims have been denied------OUCH!

Shopify CEO Vows to "Fight" CRA Audit



Tobias Lutke, CEO of Ottawa based Shopify, is

standing up to <u>CRA's auditing tactics</u>. In a <u>recent Tweet</u> he explained, *"I don't particularly want a fight with the CRA–but we got asked to backchannel them 6 years of records for all Canadian Shopify stores. This feels like a low-key overreach to me. We will fight this."* Shopify is fighting turning over 6 years of tax records of their customers to the Canadian government and is framing this request as a "targeted attack on their customers," according to a <u>Globe and Mail article</u>.

New Business Owner Not Online and Can't Authorize Accountant

Welcome to the club as this has been the ice bucket shock for 2023, but as of right now the <u>My Business Account</u> is the only way to perform this service. Like the <u>My Account</u>, there is a 10-day waiting period before you can complete the authorization which has been the frustrating part. This is all part of the bigger plan to move everything towards <u>e</u>-<u>services</u>, and while some accountants are batting for those not online, they are by far in the minority. Over 90% of Canadians are not only online but are performing much of their business there besides taxes, so the trend makes sense. Some professionals like me are addressing CRA to see if they can allow the authorizing feature instantly so they can carry on the filing with their professional. More on this as the 2024 tax season approaches. Good Luck!
