Thanksgiving Message

Dear Clients and Friends,

Another summer passed by us, and we are having a warm fall so far here in Southern Alberta. Farmers in our community have had a bumper crop which is wonderful for them and the community, so that's good news considering how the markets are doing. I have always liked all 4 seasons and while the mountains still do not have much snow, I always look forward to when I can take my sled out on the prairies surrounding my farm.

If I had to make a unique Christmas present this year it would be a t-shirt that says "I survived 2020." In all my life, I have never seen such a crazy year which seemed to put the whole world into a controlled lock down depending on where you live. Here in Alberta we have been comparatively lucky compared to Eastern provinces which still have very tyrannical laws restricting movement, business, and life in general as a second COVID wave is expected this month. People over the summer were rising to the oppressive rules which were not only destroying lives but seen as political theater by the leaders considering they didn't follow their own laws. 2020 Tax Service Now Available



As some of you were alerted to in the

summer, 2020 tax preparation service is now available. Those who have all their information or are filing zero income can take advantage of this service and avoid the rush. You can also get the paperwork yourself from the <u>forms website</u>. Unfortunately, most will have to wait until early March 2021 when they have all their T-slips, etc. One of the bonuses is the 2020 calculations are also available (of course based on the current information) so, for example, if a client foresees a sizable amount of money coming from a buyout with the option to defer, it's always recommended they book a consultation to utilize the most tax advantageous strategy. I have done several of these and have saved clients untold thousands with a brief planning tactic. Unfortunately, most end up paying too much tax on severances because they are not properly informed on how to address it!

E-File Available All Year

For those of you who have been following my newsletters over the years, it's exciting to know that E-file is now



available year-round for personal returns. You can now file previous returns if you're behind up to 4 years, meaning you can go back to 2016. September 23rd Throne Speech Details



Last month parliament reconvened for

a <u>Throne Speech</u>. <u>The basis of the speech</u> included COVID-19, economic rebuilding, and addressing Canadian values. <u>Knowledge Bureau has a detailed report</u> one should go through to learn what will be unveiled over the next year, but no doubt there will be further details as 2021 arrives. More to come on this in the New Year.

CRA Warns of "Offshore Annuity Scam"



In the summer, there was a scam going around in which <u>tax schemes involved</u>

<u>leveraged insured annuity plans.</u> Promoters, including tax representatives and tax preparers, are claiming that taxpayers can extract tax-free earnings from corporations or claim large insurance expenses using a leveraged insured annuity provided by supposed offshore insurers. Strangely enough, I'd never heard of this and neither have any of my colleagues in the industry, so I have no examples to sight at the moment but if you come across any, let me know. There was also a bulletin about a <u>bad-debt tax scheme</u>, but same thing with trying to find a "for instance."

Good News Coming for 1st Time Home Buyers



One of the announcements in the throne speech was enhancements to the First-Time Home Buyer Incentive, including in Canada's largest cities like

Toronto & Vancouver, so more families can afford to buy their first home. No further definition was provided about what this expansion means, or how further assistance will be provided to Canadians living in the pricier parts of the country, but <u>Knowledge Bureau has a short</u> <u>article</u> on this. Biker Gangs Have Infiltrated the Canada Revenue Agency



Just when you think it could not get any worse—it did! According to a <u>Rebel News</u>

story, CRA sights "several serious risk associations" where criminals infiltrated its databases. The disclosure was made by a senior manager at a labour board hearing <u>according to news site Blacklocks</u>. Apparently it was not the first time, according to a <u>Sudbury article</u> in 2018, a CRA worker Christopher Casola, 48, was sentenced to 30 months in jail on Dec. 3 for accessing tax information as well as two weapons-related charges; he was also a moonlighter outlaw biker. The jaw dropping details only came out in testimony before the Public Sector Labour Relations and Employment Board, and there has been no further comment from the CRA to date.

Improved Benefits for Pensioners and the Disabled

Good news for those on pensions and those deemed disabled. The Thrown Speech indicated it will move forward



Old Age Security (OAS) and the Canada Pension Plan Survivor's Benefit. For the disabled, a new Canadian Disability Benefit will be introduced. OAS will see a 10% increase after the age of 75, while CPP survivors will see a 25% increase. A new Canadian Disability Benefit will be modelled after the Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS) for low-income seniors. Following that model, the new Canada Disability Benefit would be available to low-income individuals who are disabled. Details have not been announced, so it is not clear whether this benefit will only be available to those who are eligible for the Disability Amount or to a wider group, including recipients of the CPP Disability Benefit and disability benefits from Veterans Affairs, but check out an <u>article from Knowledge Bureau</u>.

Average Canadian Family Spent 46.2% of Their Household Income on Taxes in 2019



A recent <u>Fraser Institute study</u> found that Canadians spent about 43% of their income on taxes last year. Also, it found necessities such as food, shelter, and clothing combined took up 36.2%. By comparison, 33.5% of the average family's income went to pay taxes in 1961 while 56.5% went to necessities. In 2019, the average Canadian family earned an income of \$91,535 and paid total taxes equalling \$38,963 (42.6%). Comparatively in 1961, the average family had an income of \$5,000 and paid a total tax bill of \$1,675 (33.5%). <u>Knowledge Bureau has an article</u> which gives other comparisons so you can get the right perspective.

CRA Increases Flat Rate



Amount for Meal Claims, and Reasonable Amount for Meal

Benefits and Allowances for 2020 Tax Year

Good news for those claiming meal allowances as the <u>benefit</u> <u>increases from \$17.00 flat rate to \$23.00, retroactively</u> <u>January 01st, 2020</u>. The CRA's policies on taxable benefits and allowances allows an employer to exclude the value of an overtime meal or allowance, or certain travel allowances (including a meal portion), from an employee's income as long as the value is reasonable (amongst other conditions). If all the conditions are met, the employer does not need to report the value of the meal or allowance on the employee's T4 slip. Check out this <u>Knowledge Bureau article</u> for more details.

New T4 Slip for 2021 for 2020 COVID Pay Periods

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CRA will require employers to fill out a <u>new T4 Slip</u> for 2020 in light of the Emergency Student Benefit (CESB)

and the Canada Emergency Wage Subsidies (CEWS) payments. Employment income will be reported in Box 14 or Code 71 as usual. After this, employment income earned in specific periods will be required:

March 15 to May 9: report earnings in Code 57 (8 weeks) May 10 to July 4: report earnings in Code 58 (8 weeks) July 5 to August 29: report earnings in Code 59 (8 weeks) August 30 to September 26: report earnings in Code 60 (4 weeks)

Employers will be required to report employment income and any retroactive payments made during these periods. The government cites a specific example: employment income reported for the period April 25 to May 8 will be noted in Code 57. <u>Knowledge Bureau has more details on</u> <u>this</u>.

to COVID. There does not seem to be any end in sight, and I have heard there are deductions for doing this, so is it to my advantage to keep this going?

Dear Wes G.,

It is estimated that <u>millions of Canadians maybe in this</u> <u>situation</u>, and, at the time of writing, CRA is addressing this unique occurrence for the 2021 tax season. My understanding is there is a new <u>T2200 declaration of</u> <u>conditions of employment</u> form being created which is not yet in draft mode but it will have a special category for this 2020 event. My guess is the "once in a COVID" crowd will not get the complete "meal deal" benefits of working out of their home like those who have done it full time for years. For example, most will not have car expenses, travel, and employees but will likely have in-home, telephone, and computer costs which helps. CRA should update their <u>COVID</u> <u>tax website page</u> with the latest on this. For eligible employees, you can still deduct allowed <u>eligible employment</u> <u>expenses</u> as laid out in our <u>Employment Expense Tax Booklet</u>. More to come as this development unfolds, and Good Luck! Neel
